<u>The Streets of Our Town</u>

Recently I had a request to tell about the origin of the name, Airline Road, for the street of our town which goes from South Dennis to East Dennis. The road appears on the map of 1880 but is not named. Exactly when it became the Airline is obscure but Mr. Dean Sears says it is so called because it is the shortest way to get from South Dennis to East Dennis and vice versa. To add to the aviation orientation, several new streets have sprung up along Airline Road with such names as Jet Drive, Pilot Drive, Wing and Landing Lane. Perhaps an equally good explanation of the name might be that the hills and

valleys of the road tend to make one feel slightly airsick! Take care not to fly over the Airline for it is among our most scenic roads, with ponds and bogs, hills and curves--truly one of the loveliest Streets of Our Town.

The Dennis Historial Society maintains a Memorial Fund which was established in 1970 at the time of the death of Mrs. Samuel Carothers, who was curator at Jericho House. For many years, Mr. Richard S. Hall was treasurer for this fund, and contributions have been made in memory of many devoted friends of Dennis.

The Executive Board voted recently to place a book containing the names in whose memory money has been contributed into each of the two historic centers. A book will also be in each house, which will list the various exhibits and furnishngs which have been purchased from this fund. In this way we will continue to remember and honor those who, in their lifetimes, have been interested in the preservation of Dennis history. Contributions are welcome and should be made directly to the Treasurer, Mr, Joshua Crowell, marked for the Memorial Fund. Fly the Flag on the Fourth of July

A Bicentennial benefit that seems to continue has been an increase in the number of flags being flown at private homes and businesses. Flags and pennants are important in an area of rich maritime history such as the Cape, being used not only for identification but as signals and to pass messages from place to place and from vessel to vessel.

The Town of Dennis has the distinction of having its own official flag, designed by the Bicentennial Commission in 1975. Mr. Everett Durgin, vexillologist, has kindly furnished us with the following information.

The town flag was designed to incorporate the town seal, consisting of a tun schooner encircled by a chain. The vessel depicted is the type which was used to fish on George's Bank in the 1800's. Many of these ships were manned by Dennis men. The colors of the flag are a light blue background, with dark blue letters, designated Nobscusset Blue, using the Indian name for the area now called Dennis; the chain is golden cornmeal yellow, symbolic of the corn which was so essential to the economy of the first settlers; all on a light blue background, with white for the ships sails and waves.

Mr. Durgin reported to the Dennis Historical Commission in June, 1979, that flags are now placed in all of the Public buildings designated by the Commission. This lovely flag is one of which all Dennis citizens can be proud.
