WORDEN REUNION

Scheduled for Sept. 15 and 16, a family reunion will bring descendants of Peter Worden back to visit ancestral lands. Wordens of that name no longer live in Dennis, although many Dennis families have Worden blood by virtue of a female ancestor. Fourth generation male Wordens sold their ancient grants and moved to Rhode Island and points west, no doubt in search of more fertile land. I know of another reunion of a Dennis resident with a descendant of Peter Worden, not in Dennis on a pleasant Fall weekend, but in New York, at a time of high excitement and crisis. It was March, 1862. Civil war was raging in the South. The Northern strategists were trying desperately to make a dramatic move which would bring the war to a swift conclusion. The chance came when news that the C.S.S. Virginia, formerly the U.S.S. Merrimac, was steaming towards Hampton Roads. At New York, the new Union iron clad U.S.S. Monitor was at last ready to enter the fray, and the crew rejoiced at the opportunity to face the iron clad southern foe. In command of the Monitor, as she lumbered out of Long Island Sound and along the coast to Hampden Roads, was Lt. John L. Worden. And onboard the pilot boat responsible for getting the Monitor there safely was Capt. Frederick Nickerson of South Dennis. I presume they must have had a chance to talk with each other, and perhaps they shared the knowledge that, generations before, their first American ancestors were pioneers together in the same small town on Cape Cod. It is a strange coincidence, one which these two men could not have even conjectured about, that a part of the grants to each of their ancestors is being considered at town meeting, 1984, to become town property almost 350 years later.

Channel 58 has scheduled programs on Historic Preservation, not only of buildings, but of antiques, documents and other things. Tune in to Good Morning, Cape Cod at 9 A.M. on May 1 and 2. Nancy Reid will be among several people to be interviewed.

LADY SLIPPER WALK

Last year, our lady slipper walk was held under what might be termed adverse weather conditions. We hope to fare better this year, as we walk the Indian Lands Conservation Area with botanist Dr. N.H. Nickerson, Jr. of Tufts University, on June 2nd at 10 A.M. We have a botanical treasure on this conservation peninsula, and if you enjoy a pleasant morning walk, join us in the Town Hall parking lot. You will also hear some history of the Indian Lands, and also the progress of an archaeological survey of the adjacent Nickerson property.

SOME INDIAN HISTORY RECOVERED

In addition to the purchase of the Worden land (now known as the Whitfield Johnson property), Town Meeting will consider taking an option to buy another large and historically interesting piece of land. It is the Nickerson property on Bass River, a 23+ acre piece of uplands and wetlands just north of the present Indian Land Conservation Area. It is possible that it is part of Nicholas Nickerson's original grant from the proprietors in 1674. There is an ancient cellar hole on the property which Pauline Derick can document as far back as 1740, and it may be earlier. It was at one time the home of Shubael Nickerson, an ancestor of Frederick in the above article. The land is also the site of the first bridge to span Bass River. Built in 1817, it was a toll bridge to foot traffic, horses, animals and carts. The only free passage was to men going to military training, or for those going to public worship. The most exciting interest, however, from an historical point of view, is that the area is rich in Indian history. Indians lived on both sides of the river, which experts believe was a fresh water stream before the sea level rose. This area shows indications of having been a permanent village for some generations. Under the sponsorship of the Dennis Historical Commission, professional archaeologists are at present surveying the land, through the courtesy of the present owner. The surveyors are excited by some of their early findings and hope that the mapping and documentation of the layers of civilization they uncover will shed some light on the lifestyle of the natives of this place. You are asked NOT to walk out on the site; Conservation Officers and the police will be alert to protect the owner's rights. However, later, we will get permission for a guided group tour of the survey site, so that you may see the excavations first hand.
