The Streets of Our Town

Ferry Street, West Dennis used to be the main street through the village. And of course, it was so named because, until the year 1832, a ferry ran across Bass River from the end of Ferry Street to the Yarmouth side. The ferry-men were members of the Kelley family and they could be summoned from the 'tother side of the river by using the conch shells hanging from posts at either landing. The fare was first 1¢ then 2¢ per passenger, but 25¢ for a horse and carriage. The flat-bottomed boat often had a tough time navigating against wind and current. After much sober reflection, the towns folks decided to form a stock company and build a bridge, which of course, ended the career of the ferry-men. Wet Bikers Get Traditional Treat

Cider, donuts, apples, and strawberry wine were waiting for the group that went on the second fall bike tour. Mary Fishler remembered her old cousin, Obed Shiverick, reminiscing about one of the favorite local Halloween happenings which was dressing up in one's "awfuls" for a hay ride followed by strawberry wine and other treats at the farm. Mrs. Fishler came all the way from New Jersey the night before the bike ride to set the scene for history to relive itself. The weather took care of getting the bikers into the "awfuls". Just as the group was ready to leave Chapin Beach for the last stop, the farm, the rain which had been holding off all morning, came to costume the crowd. The bikers arrived at the farm drippy wet and the finest clothing had the look of what Obed Shiverick would call "awfuls". The treats served up with warm hospitality and mixed with history and local yearns gave the bikers a dry and memorable finale to the tour.

Tobey Farm was given by "King's Grant" back in 1678 to an ancestor of the present occupants, Jim and Mary Fisk, for Thomas Tobey's service in King Phillip's War. The family has farmed the land ever since. Big crops were needed when the family owned the Nobscusset Hotel and had to provide food for all their guests. The Fisks continue to work the soil and their rustic farm kitchen was full of squash and pumpkins, their last crops. The tour had started at Carleton Hall where Joshua Crowell told of life

The tour had started at Carleton Hall where Joshua Crowell told of life and changes by the Village Green. Then the bicyclists pedaled over to the Josiah Dennis Manse where Esther Howes gave a guided tour through the Manse and told more about Josiah Dennis, the Whig Street area, and the old Nobscusset Hotel. Then the group headed out to Chapin Beach stopping along the way to visit Mrs. Bottero to learn about how she and Dr. Bottero came to the area and saw many other Italians join them until the section became know as "Little Italy". The group got an Italian farewell. At the beach, Gail Hart told about Cultured Clam Corp. and showed some Indian arrow heads that had been found along Chapin Beach. Nancy Flinkstrom talked about the canal that might have been built through Chase Garden Creek and Bass River. And George MacDonald from the Conservation Commission spoke on erosion which effects can clearly be seen there on the beach.
