Fate of a Dennis Schooner

My parents, Richardson and Nancy Thacher Reid, live in a beautiful Victorian home in the historic district of South Dennis. It is ten rooms of vintage elegance, complete with gingerbread trim, a gabled window (once my bedroom) and a regal "tower" from which Bass River can be seen through triangular windows. This impressive home at 480 Main Street was completed in 1892 by Captain Roland Baker Kelley, and it remained his pride and joy to the end of his life.





Roland Kelley was a successful seaman, transporting merchandise from ports around the United States and abroad. His three-masted, 252 ton schooner, the M.E. Eldredge, carried products such as coal, cotton and clay as well as foodstuffs from the southern states, around New England, Nova Scotia, Cuba, and the Caribbean. He and his crews braved many a storm at sea, several of which were chronicled in the local papers, such as their miraculous survival of the

Roland Kelley, born 1851, son of Elisha Kelley and Eliza Jane Crowell, was brought up in South Dennis and married my great-grand-aunt, Amelia Thacher, in 1872. The couple would have seven children, the youngest, Gertrude, born in the new house. There was a huge housewarming party when the home was completed, and the newspaper lists a menu of gastronomic delights as well as the entertainment, which was provided by the Kelley children singing and playing various instruments.

blizzard of November 1898 in which many vessels and their crews were lost. The M.E. Eldredge was run ashore and completely dismasted, but all aboard her survived, and the schooner was not a total loss.

As residents of Capt. Kelley's beloved home, we have always kept a photo of his schooner in a prominent place on our living room wall, as well as a photo of Roland, his wife Amelia, and five of their children in the music room. I had often wondered what happened to Capt. Kelley's schooner, and recently found my answer in the newspaper archives.

An article out of Havana, Cuba details the loss of the M.E. Eldredge in a hurricane in May 1917. Nine crewmen and the

captain (not Kelley, but a captain named Delbat) were able to escape the sinking of the ship in a life vessel, with only a can of peaches for sustenance. The poor fellows were helpless in the open seas for eighteen days. Sadly, the captain and one crew member perished of thirst and exposure, but the rest managed to cling to life. They later reported that they caught a shark with ropes and drank its blood for life-sustaining fluids. At last, they were spotted by a passing ship and rescued, recovering from their ordeal in Havana.

Captain Roland Kelley was one of the last active sea captains in Dennis, as the encroaching railroad system gradually made sea transport obsolete. Certainly, he must have been devastated at the loss of his captain, crewman and his vessel, even as his means of livelihood was fading with the times. Captain Roland Kelley died in April 1923 at his treasured home where his ghost is still occasionally encountered.... but that's another story!

2021 Historic Preservation Award

DENNIS HISTORY... REIMAGINED: This year's Burton Derick Historic Preservation Awards were presented by Diane Rochelle, chairperson of the Dennis Historical Commission, for four recent renovation/restoration projects in Dennis. The presentation occurred at the Josiah Dennis Manse Museum on a beautiful Saturday afternoon, August 21st as part of the Manse Committee's annual Colonial Day festivities.

The properties recognized this year were (clockwise from top left) 858 Route 6A (Main Street), Dennis, built circa 1780 by John Hall (Cape Cod style of architecture): 20 Corporation Road, Dennis, built circa 1798 by Nathan Hall (Federal style of architecture); 46 Pleasant Street, East Dennis, built circa 1853 by captain Joshua Sears (Victorian Eclectic style of architecture); and 30 Upper County Road, South Dennis, built circa 1870 by William Allister (Greek Revival style of architecture).

Burton "Burt" Derick, a 12th-generation Cape Codder who grew up in Dennis Port and South Dennis, was a longtime local historian, meticulous researcher, and indefatigable champion for the preservation of early Dennis homes. These annual awards for historic stewardship have been given in his memory since 2014.


